

Riverland's first purpose built backpacker resort open

Quality seasonal worker accommodation in the Riverland is getting a boost with the opening today of the new purpose-built 236-bed Paringa Backpackers' Resort by Regional Development Minister Geoff Brock.

The new complex is the first dedicated purpose-built seasonal workers' resort to be built in the Riverland and includes 28 cabin-type accommodation units, wifi internet, a swimming pool, two separate barbecue areas, a recreation lounge, a gym and a staff training centre.

The \$3.6 million project, built by Rockford Homes, received funding of \$1.2 million under the Regional Development and Innovation Fund (RDIF).

The RDIF is part of the Regional Economic Development element of the \$265 million South Australian River Murray Sustainability Program (SARMS). SARMS is funded by the Australian Government and delivered by Primary Industries and Regions SA.

Background

Four full-time positions will be created upon the completion of the project with additional employment opportunities possible in peak season.

The training rooms at the resort will be used by registered training organisations for pre-employment training.

As part of the accommodation package for workers, the resort will help promote available seasonal job opportunities in the Riverland and offer a transport service to places of employment.

Clever design and building principles have been employed in the build, including:

- Northerly aspect of cabins for energy efficiency
- High quality insulation throughout all buildings
- Light coloured roofs to reflect heat
- Solar systems to generate daytime electricity
- Reverse cycle heating and cooling
- Water efficient irrigation systems.
